Local bridge building competition challenges junior students to think like professional engineers

The event will take place Saturday, March 3, from 8:30a.m. to 2 p.m. at Tomken Middle School (3200 Tomken Road, Mississauga).

Held in conjunction with National Engineering Month and in collaboration with the Peel District School Board and Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board, the Mississauga event is designed to raise awareness of engineering and help middle school students develop hands-on skills through bridge design and construction. Teams of students are provided with materials needed to design and construct bridges that are judged on the basis of presentation, creativity, construction quality, construction technique and aesthetics.
